

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A Pilgrimage Journey – Going Back Home By: Primrose & Lawrence Hammond

"In celebration of Black History Month, we are delighted to share excerpts of our journey back home to the continent of Africa. As we landed in Ghana, West Africa we could feel an "Akwaaba" spirit, a Twi word denoting the official welcoming expression of the Ghanaian community. For us, this journey brought us back home to the place where our ancestors were stolen from over 400 years ago. As African and Caribbean Americans, living in the diaspora, we longed for a place of belonging which we found in the time spent with our brothers and sisters. During our journey we embraced our cultural roots reflecting the vibrancy of the African cultural experience through dance, culinary delights, community engagement and celebration. We journeyed with a group representing the 313+ Ancestors Speak Project along with members of the New York Theological Seminary community. A highlight of our journey entailed the presentation to His Royal Majesty Oseadeeyo Kwasi Akuffo III, Paramount Chief of Akuapem Traditional Area, a replica monument of a 20+ foot statue erected in Elizabeth, NJ, commemorating 381 enslaved and free African ancestors buried on the grounds of Siloam-Hope First Presbyterian Church. This was the main purpose of our pilgrimage in bringing the "ancestors" back home."

She has studied under several professional iconic trailblazers such as Kevin Thomas (R.I.S.E., Raising the Barre, @ Collage Dance Collective), Debbie Allen (Debbie Allen Dance Academy), Anthony Burrell (Breaking Barriers @ Philadanco) Kevin Iega Jeff (Deeply Rooted), and several local pre-professional and award winning dance companies; The Viva School and NGOMA Center for Dance, The Movement Studio's and ZD Dance Academy. She hopes that by gracing the stage it encourage's and inspires other brown girls and boys to believe that they can do it too.
